Derek Eller Gallery is pleased to present a solo exhibition of works on paper by David Dupuis.

Dupuis' intimate drawings are like pages of a diary suffused with longing, sexual desire, and the attendant experiences of solitude and despair. Meticulously rendered, using color pencil, graphite, and collage, each drawing is a world unto itself, populated by swirling biomorphic forms and male figures, often in states of undress. Like his predecessors Louise Bourgeois, Juan Miro, James Ensor, and Jean Delville, sex, death, and an aspiration for beauty haunt his work.

"His body which I had come to know so well, glowed in the light and charged and thickened the air between us. Then something opened in my brain, a secret, noiseless door swung open, frightening me: it had not occurred to me until that instant that in fleeing from his body, I confirmed and perpetuated his body's power over me. David Dupuis' work was recently included in *Utopia/Dystopia: Construction and Destruction in Photography and Collage*, Museum of Fine Arts Houston, Houston, TX; *It's Always Summer on the Inside*, organized by Dan McCarthy, Anton Kern Gallery, New York, NY; *B-Out*, curated by Scott Hug, Andrew Edlin Gallery, New York, NY; and *Hair and Skin*, curated by Isaac Lyles, Derek Eller Gallery, New York, NY. His work is included in a number of museum collections including the Whitney Museum of American Art, San Francisco Museum of Modern Art, the Hammer Museum, and the New Museum of Contemporary Art. Dupuis lives and works in New York City. This will be his eighth solo exhibition at the gallery.

North Room: Jesse Greenberg

Derek Eller Gallery is pleased to present Jesse Greenberg's first solo exhibition in New York.

The biological forms evoked by Greenberg's wall works and small sculptures are as familiar as they are discomforting. Composed of urethane resin and colored pigment, the works contain percolating bubbles and a flowing alchemy, a painterly quality complimented by a palette that is alternately seductive and repulsive. Greenberg says, "I'm witness to these bizarre fluid moments, and though I'm making sculpture, my medium is liquids, and the membranes that contain them." His work reflects back to the post-minimalism of Eva Hesse and Lynda Benglis and forward to the post-human future conjured by David Croenenberg and a new generation of visual artists.

Jesse Greenberg lives and works in Brooklyn, New York. Greenberg has had solo and two-person exhibitions at Loyal Gallery, Malmo, Sweden; White Flag Projects, St. Louis, MS; and Kansas, New York, NY. His work has also been included in *Trouble Everyday*, Vogt Gallery, New York; *Queens International*, Queens Museum of Art, New York, NY; and *Perfectly Damaged*, Derek Eller Gallery, New York. Jesse Greenberg is also the co-director of 247365 in Brooklyn, New York.
