Elaborate drawings are filled with collaged skulls (all the rage in art this season) and eyes, and dense, concentric rings of colored pencil. Some make a link between the body and landscape, others are portraits (John F. Kennedy, Jr., crops up as a subject). Stylistic references hopscotch from Japanese Edo-period fabrics to folkloric religious icons to portraiture. A selection of self-portraits, made during a period in which the artist drew one a day, fall somewhere between the product of a life-drawing class and a contemporary channelling of Frida Kahlo.
